#### 4. BACKGROUND / MAIN ISSUES

- 4.1 Perth and Kinross Council owns land and property which forms part of the Common Good of the former burghs in Perth and Kinross and has a statutory duty in terms of section 15 of the Local Government etc. (Scotland) Act 1994 to administer this land and property "having regard to the interests of the inhabitants" of those former burghs. This duty also applies to the administration of the associated Common Good Funds.
- 4.2 The Common Good Funds have traditionally demonstrated their support to local residents and organisations by distributing grants. These grant awards allow individuals and local organisations to carry out a wide range of community-based activities.
- 4.3 Applications to Common Good Funds vary across the different former burghs of Perth and Kinross. Applications to Common Good Funds vary across the different former burghs of Perth and Kinross. This report is for the Aberfeldy Common Good Fund.

- 4.4 The estimated income for financial year 2022/23, and the value of the application to be considered at this meeting, is summarised below:

## 5. PROPOSALS – SMALL GRANTS

### Aberfeldy Festive Committee

- 5.1 An application for £1,044 has been received from the Aberfeldy Festive Committee to contribute to their Christmas Market project, which will take place on 3 December 2022. The all-day event will include: the switching on of the Aberfeldy Christmas lights; performers including a local dance group, choirs, and Atholl Pipe Band/Wind Band; a Christmas parade; Santa's Grotto; and around 20 stalls for various businesses and charities to promote their services and sell Christmas gifts. The Christmas Market has been a part of community life for around two decades but has been unable to take place over the last two years due to the pandemic. Entry to the Market will be free.
- 5.2 195 people from the Common Good Area, 50 people from elsewhere in Perth and Kinross, and 80 people from outside of Perth and Kinross (all of varying ages) are estimated to benefit from the project.
- 5.3 The total cost of the project is £2,044. A breakdown of the costs has been provided below. The applicant has not received grant funding from the Common Good Fund in the last three years.

## Aberfeldy Church of Scotland

- 5.4 An application for £3,330 has been received from the Aberfeldy Church of Scotland to contribute to their Upper Tay Church of Scotland Community Newsletter project. The project is to produce and distribute 3 editions (over the course of a year) of the free-of-charge Upper Tay Community Newsletter in hard copy to all PH9 and PH15 houses and further afield through the digital version. The newsletter contains a register of voluntary community-based activities and essential services. The community are invited to make contributions, including recipes, photos and articles, but it will not promote any businesses and does not contain advertising as the group want the newsletter to remain a register of voluntary activities and essential services, rather than a commercial magazine.
- 5.5 45% of those who receive a paper copy of the newsletter are from the Common Good Area. The rationale for distributing the newsletters outside of the Common Good Area is that the services offered in the directory are almost exclusively within the Common Good Area but the group do not want to exclude those who live in the rural community from accessing them. The newsletter was first published in April 2020 and focused on providing essential service information such as details on collecting prescriptions, accessing free meals and delivery of food/other necessary items. Subsequent editions have focused on health and wellbeing, encouraging people to be active. The Aberfeldy Healthiest Town initiative and GP practice both use the Newsletter as a source of information, and the Council uses it to promote initiatives such as Ways to Wellbeing and the Adult Learning Hub. The group may no longer be in a position to continue publishing and distributing the newsletter without funding, as they have funds to cover some of the Autumn Edition costs, but not the December Edition.
- 5.6 The total cost of the project is £3,330. A breakdown of the costs has been provided below. The applicant has not received grant funding from the Common Good Fund in the last three years.
